# **Focus** on the Kingdom

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### God, Our Free Will and Our Responsibility to Believe

Genesis 6:6-7 reports the amazing fact that God, viewing the sorry state of sinful mankind on earth, actually regretted that He had made man! God was sorry about His own creation of man! He was grieved in His heart at that tragic spectacle of humanity, massively and resolutely opposed to its own Maker. This is the ultimate level of tragedy in the appalling chronicle of world history. It also points to the staggering truth that God has honored human beings with the enormous privilege of choice. We are not puppets in the hands of God. Much less has God consigned the baby being born as I write, say in Atlanta, to perpetual torture forever and ever (the ghastly doctrine of Calvinism).

The same awful possibility of fatally wrong choice as demonstrated before the Flood threatens our world. The Bible as the authoritative constitution for us all, as to how we are to conduct our affairs, has been widely "ditched" as irrelevant. This is a fearful state of affairs. "As in the days of Noah..." Jesus warned commenting on the state of affairs which he foresaw would characterize society just before his return.

The justice of God and of Jesus His appointed agent will prevail. It is our wisdom as individuals to repent and bring our lives into line with the commands of God. God after all has determined "to judge and administer the world with justice through a MAN Jesus, whom He has appointed for this task, and He has given public proof of this by raising him from the dead" (see Acts 17:30-31). Bringing a dead person back to life is about as dramatic and incontrovertible proof of divine activity and miracle as one can have!

Some commentators seem embarrassed by the straightforward words of Genesis 6:6-7. Their preconceived idea of what God may and may not do leads them to dissolve the plain meaning of the text and cry "anthropomorphism" — a long word which simply means that they think that God, being God, only *appears* to regret having made man! After all, since God, as they suppose, knows every detail of everything that happens in advance, He could not regret anything that He did, and could not have been grieved. But the Bible states otherwise. It reveals the same truth about God's fascinating and amazing dealings with man, and our responsibility and free will, when in 1 Samuel 15:11 we

read that God **regretted having made Saul king**. Saul turned out unimaginably bad.

It was recently observed, "If you deny that one has to have some control, in order to be blamed for anything, then you have moved into Calvinist territory. I urge you not to go there; it is a theology which portrays, frankly, an evil God, who eternally tortures the majority of the human race, people who never received the slightest opportunity of not being damned, having been damned by an inflexible decree before the creation of the world." These were the wise words of Professor Dale Tuggy, from correspondence.

From one commentary, not seeing the point, we have the failure to believe that GOD can indeed regret and grieve, on some occasions, when things turned out worse than He, allowing man a measure of free will, anticipated: "When NaCHaM [Hebrew for 'to be sorry, to repent'] is used of God, however, the expression is anthropopathic [ascribing human feelings to God] and there is no ultimate tension. From man's limited, earthly, finite perspective it only appears that God's purposes have changed."

This is a cop-out. God really did feel sorrow and grief at the appalling depravity of man or individuals on some occasions. These marvelous texts in Genesis and 1 Samuel diminish in no way the absolute uniqueness and unlimited power of the One God:

"Let the heavens praise Your wonders, O LORD [Yahweh or Yehovah], your faithfulness in the assembly of the holy ones. For who in the skies can be compared to the LORD? Who among the heavenly beings is like the LORD, a God feared in the council of the holy ones, great and awesome above all that are around Him? O LORD God of hosts, who is as mighty as You, O LORD? Your faithfulness surrounds you. You rule the raging of the sea; when its waves rise, You still them" (Psalm 89:5-9).∻

### Non-Negotiable Points of Obedience

- 1. We are to repent and believe the Gospel of the Kingdom (Mark 1:14-15).
- 2. We are to listen to the first, principal command of Jesus that "the Lord our God is one Lord" (Mark 12:29).
- 3. We are to obey the command to be baptized in water upon reception of the Gospel (Acts 8:12, etc.).
- 4. We are to understand that salvation depends on obedience to Jesus (Heb. 5:9) and requires

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persistence to the end (Rom. 11:22; 13:11; Luke 8:13).

5. We are to love our enemies and give serious thought about whether it is ever right to kill any of them, lest we disobey Jesus! (Heb. 5:9; John 3:36).

### Defining the One God with Confidence and Clarity

The great, central core of biblical faith was emphasized by Jesus, who was of course a supreme teacher of and believer in the One God, the Father. Jesus uttered this plain and simple unitarian, non-Trinitarian statement when defining the essence of what it means for us to gain the Life of the Age to Come: "This is the Life of the Age to Come: that they believe in You, Father, who are the only one who is true God" (John 17:3). This is simply an unarguable assertion of the unique and sole Deity of the Father. It is a tragedy that many Bible readers stumble at it under the crushing church tradition pressure of and "theological correctness"! Your three-year-old has no trouble with easy statements like John 17:3. What about this from John: "On the next day the people who remained on the other side of the sea saw that there had been only one boat there" (John 6:22). Let's argue about what "only one boat" means! Let's not! But when it comes to John 17:3, "only one God, the Father," a fact repeated over 1300 times in the NT, pandemonium and chaos break out (we see it daily on the internet!).

It is wise for us to pay the closest attention to the easy creedal words of Jesus in Mark 12:29 and John 17:3. These propositions must form the firm foundation of our Christian faith and obedience. And without obedience to Jesus no one can be saved (John 3:36; Heb. 5:9; 1 Tim. 6:3; 2 John 7-9; Acts 5:22). $\Rightarrow$ 

### The Trouble with "Christianity" as Uncritically Accepted by Many

"Christianity did not destroy paganism; it adopted it. The Greek mind, dying, came to a transmigrated life in the theology and liturgy of the Church; the Greek language, having reigned for centuries over philosophy, became the vehicle of Christian literature and ritual...Other pagan cultures contributed to the syncretist [a hodge-podge "soup" and mixture of various religions] result. From Egypt came the ideas of a divine Trinity...and the mystic theosophy that made Neoplatonism and Gnosticism, and obscured the Christian creed...[Orthodox] Christianity was the last great creation of the ancient pagan world."

(Historian Will Durant, *Caesar and Christ: The Story of Civilization*, Vol. 3, p. 1).

# John 1:1: The Elephant in the Room

The Bible is, alas, in some passages a sort of crime scene. Unwary readers, who claim that they just go by the Bible and *only* (anyone want to argue about the word "only" here?!) by the Bible, do not know that they are sometimes naively in the hands of translators from the original Greek (in the NT). The classic example of this is John 1:1-3. Your version of the Bible probably speaks of the "Word" (with capital W) and tells you that "In the beginning the Word was with God." You instinctively read "Word" as a second Person, other than the Father. You then hear "Jesus the Word, a second Deity, was with the Father." You are hearing that the Son, that is "God the Son," was with the Father, both as fully God and uncreated. That makes two who are eternal GOD.

What you may not know is that *logos* in the Greek text means "word" and not "Word," a Person. Hundreds of examples of this are to be found in the Old Testament, which is 75% of our Bible. Jews spoke of God's "word" as His self-expression, God in His wisdom carrying out His unique wise plan for the world.

Perhaps you did not know that all the English translations from the Greek, before the King James Version of 1611, did not force you into thinking of "word" (*logos*) as a Person separate from the One God, the Father. Either they did not put a capital letter on "word" or they described "word" as "it." "All things came into being through **it**." That sort of statement is echoed in Jewish literature from the same time period as our New Testament.

**Robert Rector, senior research fellow in domestic policy studies at Heritage Foundation**, the author of an interesting article on "Marriage: America's Greatest Weapon Against Child Poverty." laments the fact that "When the War on Poverty began in the mid-1960s, only 6 percent of children were born out of wedlock...In 2008, 40.6 percent of all children born in the U.S. were born outside of marriage."

That is an easy but shocking statistic to grasp. Note the massive church presence in the USA has not been able to stem that decline. Sex belongs in God's scheme only within marriage, the proper environment for providing a safe nest for children!

God gave rules and a constitution for the human race. Sex belongs strictly in marriage only. Then a safe haven is provided for the inevitable children. Disobey that, as we have, and you have inevitable chaos.

The remedy: return to the teaching of Jesus and the Bible. This takes lots of persistent teaching and a refusal to compromise. A nation claiming to be "under God" cannot afford to thwart the laws of God about marriage and family. Nor can we afford to turn a blind eye and a deaf ear to the words of Jesus.

#### God's "Supersize" Promises

The Bible says: "GOD loved the world in this way [so the Greek]: that He gave His uniquely begotten SON [Luke 1:35], so that all who believe and obey him [Heb. 5:9] should not be consumed in a fire and cease to exist, but have the Life of the Future Age of the Kingdom" (John 3:16).

## Speaking of "Tongues" (Languages)

I received this from an avid Kingdom, One God believer and offer it for our readers' consideration. It comes from Helen Nielson of Alaska and she kindly allows us to share her experience with you.

Your message has not been forgotten and now I will spend a little time replying to the issue of "tongues" from my perspective, starting with my background. (I am including the scripture references we used to back up our dogma, even though it is highly probable that the scriptures have been twisted in many cases.) I was raised in the Catholic Church and while attending a Catholic women's college I first heard a nun "speak in tongues." Thus began a journey which included attending charismatic prayer meetings, seeking the experience and turning my attention and total devotion to the religious life. I first "spoke in tongues" while alone in my dorm room, initially thinking I was making up the sounds that came out of my mouth, but later reassured with confidence by the same Roman Catholic nun that I was in fact speaking in tongues to God, Who understood, even if I didn't (1 Cor. 14:2). Varied circumstances led me to want to know more about the spiritual gifts and I attended a special three-week class on these, which ultimately changed the course of my life. I was instructed in the "proper use" of each of the nine gifts as my teacher had been "shown" by God (or so he claimed). It is hard to resist "God told me..."

I made a decision to leave college, the Catholic Church and even laid aside my plans to enter the convent, in order to attend a small Bible school and feed my strong spiritual hunger. I was taught that to properly serve God I should do the works as delineated in Mark 16:15-18, including speaking in tongues, casting out demons and healing the sick. I wholeheartedly accepted this teaching. It made very good sense.

Upon graduation from Bible school, two of my fellow students and I formed a "trio" and began to travel the country and even Mexico, teaching the "full gospel" of salvation — confession of Jesus as Savior, "once saved, always saved," receiving the "baptism of the Holy Ghost" (evidenced by "speaking in tongues") and utilizing all the spiritual gifts.

This included of course an emphasis on "ministering healing" to the sick. Imagine how thrilled we were whenever someone "spoke in tongues," fully believing that this person had been filled with the "Holy Ghost" and confirmed as a believer in Christ. Of note — we were even counselors at a Bible camp where many of the junior high campers "spoke in tongues" as we instructed them to do (we likened it always to the day of Pentecost and the start of true revival).

The "trio" dissolved, but I continued to make it foremost in my life to preach the Kingdom of God, which I fully believed meant using all the nine gifts as the Apostles did in the book of Acts. I made it my priority to teach my five children these things and was comforted when they "spoke in tongues" at very early ages (usually somewhere around three years of age). I took great comfort in this, believing that when anyone "spoke in tongues," they belonged to God, sealed until the day of redemption (Eph. 1:13-14).

I did not believe it was required for salvation, but rather a seal or confirmation of having salvation. When a person was "born again," accepting Christ as their Savior, I believed that God put a new creature or new spirit into them (2 Cor. 5:17 — once again, twisted — we don't "get" a new creature; we *are* new creatures in Christ). It was this new creature which received and used spiritual gifts, for the natural man, or flesh, was corrupt (1 Cor. 2:11, 14; John 6:63: "the flesh profits nothing"). I thought that a believer who was Spirit-filled had an "edge" when it came to understanding the Scriptures, being more able to "receive revelation" directly from God (1 Cor. 2:12-13). (Rather a snobbish attitude!)

According to the teaching, it was important to spend much time praying in tongues (Paul said he thanked God he spoke in tongues "more than you all," 1 Cor. 14:18), because prayer in tongues was understood by God (1 Cor. 14:2), and our understanding is unfruitful (1 Cor. 14:14). The whole reason for "praying in tongues" is to bypass the carnal mind, which is enmity against God (Rom. 8:7), and therefore interferes with perfect prayer. "Prayer in tongues" is according to God's will, and as such is always answered (1 John 5:14-15). I made a conscious and conscientious effort to "pray in tongues" silently whenever I thought about it, even while driving or doing the dishes. Yes, it became an ingrained practice, for I still catch myself doing it without thought. Even with that in mind, I often felt guilty that I didn't pray in tongues as much as I thought I should. (Is this what God wants — a spiritual guilt trip?).

The scripture we based some of the above doctrine upon was Romans 8:26-27. (I here utilize the King James, for that is the Bible I then believed was the only accurate translation! I have since seen the light of day on that issue): "Likewise the Spirit also helpeth our infirmities: for we know not what we should pray for as we ought: but the Spirit itself maketh intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered. And he that searcheth the hearts knoweth what is the mind of the Spirit, because he maketh intercession for the saints according to the will of God."

How these verses were twisted to mean "prayer in the spirit" or "prayer in tongues," I still do not know, but I firmly believed it and held to it. Obviously, I turned a blind eye to "the Spirit itself maketh intercession for us with groanings which CANNOT be uttered." As if by praying in tongues I was enabling the spirit to pray for me. It's a fog, but I was tenacious in that fog. After all "tongues" are clearly utterances, whereas "groans," Paul said, are not.

We confidently believed that we were speaking actual languages, either of men or of angels (based on Acts 2 and 1 Cor. 13). We insisted that if anyone speaks in tongues in public, they should also bring the interpretation in the language of their understanding (1 Cor. 14:13, 26). This interpretation, we thought, was what one is inspired to speak immediately following the utterance in tongues (usually including portions of scripture and always "unto edification") and was equated with prophecy (1 Cor. 14:5). We even went to the extent of "speaking in tongues" and "interpreting" (equivalent to prophesying) over individuals on special occasions, such as at water baptisms or at weddings. Once again, in all my years of such exercise, I was never personally aware of anyone recognizing "the tongue" which I spoke, as happened on the day of Pentecost.

It is quite an outrageous claim, I now realize, that a person is perfectly speaking a language they have never studied. That was sidestepped by the teaching (shown by God to my teacher) that the gift of tongues is "the Godgiven ability to speak in a language you have never learned and to speak it perfectly." If God, the giver of good and perfect gifts, gives the ability, who can question its perfection? Being able to bring the interpretation, then, was also a supernatural ability, given by God. No room for questioning or analytical reasoning. God made me able to do this. Done deal. The same goes for the other gifts, including healing the sick and performing miracles. (I no longer hold these doctrinal stances, but am just stating them here. I want to help you understand my former position.)

About five years ago, I was introduced to your pamphlets and books. *What Happens When We Die?* had the greatest impact on getting me thinking a different way about myself before God. I discarded that new creature doctrine, which also stated that when a believer dies, the

new creature sleeps in Christ and is raised up, receiving a new body at resurrection. This did not match the Scriptures. The light dawned that I was not a possessor of a new creature or new spirit (which teaching parallels having an immortal soul), but I am one whole person as in Genesis 2:7 (body with life in it). If it were true that I was merely human, I wondered, "What within me is able to speak in tongues? Or heal the sick, cast out devils, or do anything of supernatural caliber?" The false supernatural wing of my dwelling had been demolished!

I also came to realize that in almost 30 years of "praying in tongues," I could not go back to any time when I "prayed in tongues" and knew that my prayer was answered. It was all done in "unknown tongues"! I did not know what I had been saying! I had gone on blind faith that I was praying and God was looking after His part. A person can speak in such sounds and not even be thinking about anything spiritual. Is this meaningful prayer? I now think that it was merely a way of placating myself, more or less as beneficial as repeating a Buddhist mantra, setting the mind at ease, as it shuts out the cares of this world and zones out spiritually. As much could be accomplished by taking a walk in nature. It is through my understanding that I communicate with others; how much more with my Lord? Better for me to use the mind I have been given to communicate than to abandon my mind to noise. Better for me to seek to follow the commands as Jesus set forth to love God and my neighbor, than to abdicate my duty to mindless muttering, and call that service.

Yes, there is an emotional aspect, also, but we were taught against the feelings and fanaticism that often goes along with emotional displays. We considered ourselves a cut above the main charismatic circles, since we did everything "decently and in order" (1 Cor. 14:40). No frenzied outbursts allowed, no falling down, rolling, barking like dogs, or all speaking at once.

At this point in time, I would agree that "tongues," as we learned it, is a copied behavior. How else does one explain a toddler speaking in tongues at the request of his mother, who demonstrates to him how to do it? A toddler who does not yet understand all the theology that is hinged on tongues! Children were always the easiest to lead into the experience. They are touchingly eager to please. And so, for anyone who is sincere in their desire to please God, upon hearing that speaking in tongues pleases God and is a way to build one's faith, then what is stopping them from launching ahead and making sounds "as the spirit inspires them and makes them able"? (How easily we are deceived in our eagerness to do God's will!)

For so many years, I stood very firmly in what I had been taught. But as I said, my spiritual house was caving in quickly. The book on *The Doctrine of the Trinity* also

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impacted me. It clarified Jesus as my Messiah, for whom I wait and who does not expect me to speak in "tongues" (he never did), but rather teach the Kingdom of God Gospel as he taught it. I am not here to establish the church as the first apostles were commissioned to do. I am here to be guided by the Scripture writings they left. I was also taught that my mind, being at enmity against God, was fairly worthless when it came to understanding spiritual things. However, it is clear that we are to love the Lord our God with our whole heart, soul and mind (Matt. 22:37). We "are to have the mind of Christ" (1 Cor. 2:16).

One would think the mind is important then and given to us to be used to analyze what we read. God wants us to understand with our minds, not bypass them. We are all on a level playing field, after all. As Robert Hach made clear to me in his book *Possession and Persuasion*, we are to be persuaded in our minds of what we believe. We don't believe the ineffable, the inexplicable. We don't base our faith upon "supernatural experiences" as in the charismatic movement, a furtherance of gnosticism (in my opinion). Our faith is based upon the testimony of Jesus and the Scriptures. It is wonderful to be set free to serve God and not go on daily guilt trips for failing to live up to the impossible expectation of performing the miraculous.

Checks and balances for "experience" are these: "Tongues" (real languages) are a sign to unbelievers, Paul said in 1 Corinthians 14:22. This is a demonstrable, public miracle. Paul also urged the "tongues, languages gifted person," to "pray to interpret" so that all know what God is saying (1 Cor. 14:13).

P.S. Anthony, We are preparing for a journey to visit family in Montana and Minnesota. I look forward to any opportunities to speak with them about the things of God. I know most will be relieved to hear that I no longer hold to tongues and associated fallacies, having replaced such expectations with the good news of the coming kingdom of God. My parents and one brother are yet Catholic. My sister and I veered off the same direction. My other brother is conservative evangelical (I think they attend a Baptist church in Texas). It will be interesting!

Regarding the message and animation on the DVD, it was so familiar to me! In fact, when I attended the conference in Atlanta, I was astounded at the straightforward presentations by the various speakers. Having in hand the complete typed messages was a new dimension I had never known. I appreciated the openness during the question and answer session following each speaker, as well. A contrast in many ways to the altar call with laying on of hands, music in the background and of course, the encouragement to "harden not your hearts." A twinge of guilt may spur the hesitant to approach the altar to receive. I now recognize the calm compared to the storm.

As for "tongues," I lean toward it being a copied or learned behavior. Translatable languages is too much of a stretch logically. Linguists with tape recorders have repeatedly shown that "tongues" by Christians, including Mormons, and also from Tibetan monks show no evidence of being real language.

We both know that there are familiar sounds that cross over in any language and have meaning. I'm thinking of an example we used in teaching. The sound "see" means different things in English (the letter C, the sea, to see, etc.). The same sound in Spanish means "yes." What are the odds that someone in their attempt to speak in many different sounds (which is how we encouraged people to speak to receive the gift), will speak familiar sounds that may be a phrase in a foreign language?

I think we were so eager to validate our experience that we had some "testimonies" to the effect that a foreigner recognized a message in tongues and it was interpreted exactly. I personally never heard that, but was told by others. When that happens, I strongly lean toward demonic influence as the only explanation. Demons know every language, don't they? Otherwise how is it possible for them to speak through a possessed person in the language of the understanding of the possessed? But I am raising more questions than I'm answering.

When I "spoke in tongues" I don't think I was being influenced by an evil spirit. I always spoke when I chose and controlled when I stopped. I have seen people go into a frenzy and seem out of control and I wonder if demons weren't involved there. Personally, I pushed myself to make sounds that I didn't know and that is basically a function of a brain deceived — basic babble. (Ten years ago I wouldn't have imagined myself saying such things!)

I have been encouraged by your fellowship and efforts to keep the Kingdom of God Gospel at the forefront in obedience to Jesus in Mark 1:14-15. My sons have been chatting on the web in a forum with other teens and the topic of the Trinity has kept them seeking out the scriptures from Greg Deuble and your books on the Trinity. I even get to share my ideas along the way. It will be fruitful. Gentle persuasion is the best approach. ♦
